Far, far away from everything, on the tiny "Island of Pines" to the south of New Caledonia, Sr Marie du Bon Secours wrote to Fr Yardin, mission procurator in Lyons, of her privilege in belonging to the family of Mary.

... Well, here I am belonging to the family of Mary. Yes, what happiness! But how unworthy I recognise myself of such a favour. However, since Jesus and his divine Mother have deigned to adopt me as their humble servant, I hope with the help of grace, and the gracious assistance of your fervent prayers, to work generously to acquire the virtues lacking in me to merit being recognised as a true daughter of Mary! What can I tell you of my gratitude for such a favour?
