

Story

In early 1800s France, Families wealthier than the Chavoins often sent their children away to boarding school. Among them was Marie Jotillon, a clever, attractive girl, faithful to her prayers and lessons about God. One time, when Marie was home on holiday, Jeanne-Marie was shocked to see how she was dressed. Marie, then about 14 or 15 years old, had returned wearing a new fashion—colorful ribbons braided through her hair. Today, such a style might seem insignificant, but in Coutouvre at that time, it was seen as improper. Jeanne-Marie rightly discerned that the young teenager was becoming more interested in her appearance than in her faith and care for others. She wondered what she should do.





Not long before this, a young man studying to be a priest had visited Coutouvre. He was staying with the parish priest, Father Guillermet. Before long, he recognized that Jeanne-Marie was a person of strong faith and a deep desire to know God fully. They had several conversations, and he began teaching her how to pray more deeply, helping her grow in her relationship with God and understand how to become the best version of herself. This young man, Jean-Philibert Lefranc, became someone Jeanne-Marie could trust, and she confided in him about her concerns for Marie Jotillon. Jean-Philibert offered to help Marie in the same way he was helping Jeanne-Marie and suggested that Jeanne-Marie encourage her friend to meet with him.

Jeanne-Marie waited for the right moment, but she had to be patient as Marie, suspecting her friend's intentions, tried to avoid her. Finally, one day, they met at the back gate of the Chavoin house.

Jeanne-Marie invited Marie to sit with her in the backyard under the beautiful pear tree. There, she shared her concerns and spoke about the spiritual growth she had experienced through her sessions with Jean-Philibert. Eventually, Marie agreed to meet him.

From that point on, Jeanne-Marie and Marie became very close friends, bonded by their shared faith in God. They met weekly to discuss how they were growing in their love for God, how they were striving to become the people they believed God wanted them to be, where they were struggling, and how they were working to overcome their weaknesses. Such deep conversations were rare, which made their friendship uniquely special.
