Through your mouth.


Breathe in and breathe and out

Scripture - John 15:9-17

Assign different readers to read the different colours below....

Jesus said to his disciples: "Amen, amen, I say to you, whatever you ask the Father in my name he will give you. Until now you have not asked anything in my name; ask and you will receive, so that your joy may be complete. "I have told you this in figures of speech. The hour is coming when I will no longer speak to you in figures but I will tell you clearly about the Father. On that day you will ask in my name, and I do not tell you that I will ask the Father for you. For the Father himself loves you, because you have loved me and have come to believe that I came from God. I came from the Father and have come into the world. Now I am leaving the world and going back to the Father."

Scripture Reflection -

Take it in turns to read a paragraph...

This passage from the Gospel, where Jesus speaks to his disciples about prayer and their relationship with the Father, is rich in theological significance and reveals several key aspects of Christian belief.

Jesus emphasizes the power of praying in His name. This is not merely a formulaic conclusion to prayers but an acknowledgment of the authority and relationship Jesus has with the Father. Praying in Jesus' name implies a deep trust in Him and recognition of His role as the mediator between humanity and God. It's an invitation to the disciples to share in Jesus' intimate relationship with the Father.

Jesus assures His disciples that their prayers will be answered when asked in His name to bring their joy to completeness. This promise highlights the loving and generous nature of God, who desires to fulfill the needs of His children. The mention of joy being complete suggests that the fulfillment of these prayers aligns with the ultimate happiness and fulfillment found in divine communion and understanding.

Jesus mentions that He has previously used figurative language but promises a time when He will speak plainly about the Father. This indicates a progression in the disciples' spiritual understanding and readiness. As they grow in faith and closeness to Jesus, they are prepared to grasp more profound truths about God without the need for parables or metaphors.

Jesus clarifies that on that forthcoming day of deeper understanding, the disciples will have direct access to the Father in their prayers, not needing Jesus to petition on their behalf. This reflects the Christian doctrine of the Trinity, where the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are distinct but not separate, and underscores the personal relationship believers are invited to have with God.

The passage concludes with Jesus reaffirming His divine origin, His purpose in the world, and His impending return to the Father. This reaffirmation serves as a foundational truth for the disciples' faith and their preaching after Jesus' ascension. It asserts Jesus' divinity and the salvific plan of God unfolding through Jesus' life, death, resurrection, and ascension.

Finally, this Gospel passage reassures the disciples of their cherished status before God, encourages them to rely on the profound relationship they have through Jesus, and prepares them for a deeper understanding of divine mysteries. It's a foundational teaching for understanding Christian prayer, divine intercession, and the personal relationship each believer is called to have with God through Jesus Christ.

Silent Reflection

Silently reflect on the today's scripture passage and its meaning for us today. Reflect on the questions for reflection.

Discussion - You may choose to answer some of the following questions...

- 1. What was Jesus' purpose while on earth?
- 2. Jesus said, "you have loved me and have come to believe that I came from God." Do you feel God's love?
- 3. What does it mean to you to pray "in Jesus' name"?
- 4. Reflect on a time when you felt your prayer was answered or not answered. Describe this experience.
- 5. What obstacles do we face when praying?
- 6. Jesus talks about the disciples "developing over time spiritual readiness and understanding". How is this like our own spiritual growth?
