Gospel - John 1:6-8, 19-28

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah.' And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the prophet?' He answered, 'No.' Then they said to him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' He said,

'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness,

"Make straight the way of the Lord"',

as the prophet Isaiah said.

Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, 'Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?' John answered them, 'I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal.' This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

The Gospel of the Lord.

Gospel Reflection

John 1:6-8, 19-28 introduces John the Baptist, a key figure sent by God to pave the way for Jesus Christ. This passage emphasizes that John was not the Messiah or a prophetic figure like Elijah, but rather a witness to "the light" — a metaphor for Christ and his teachings. His role was to prepare people for Jesus' arrival and to encourage belief in him. When religious leaders questioned John's identity and purpose, he clarified that he was not the awaited Messiah but a voice calling in the wilderness, fulfilling Isaiah's prophecy by preparing the path for the Lord. His practice of baptizing with water was a symbol of this preparatory work. John's humility is highlighted in his admission of unworthiness even to untie the sandals of the one (Jesus) who would follow him, indicating the greater significance of Jesus' ministry. This narrative, set in Bethany across the Jordan, lays the groundwork for understanding John's role in the larger context of the Gospel, underscoring his mission to direct attention to Jesus, the true light.

Discussion

- 1. How does John the Baptist prepare the way?
- 2. How can a person today remain true to their purpose amidst external pressures and expectations?
- 3. Why is conversion important? Do we need conversion throughout our lives?
- 4. How can we prepare the way for the Lord in our own lives?
